Nevada Electrical Qualifications Card Program

Notice of Program Change

The Electrical Safety Professionals' Advisory Committee has decided to institute a change to the Nevada Electrical Card Program.

As of <u>January 1, 2024</u>, an individual applying for a <u>NEW</u> Nevada Electrical Qualifications Card will need to provide (1) a minimum of 2,000 hours of electrical work experience or electrical apprenticeship program hours <u>and</u> (2) the Pass Letter received from the International Code Council ("ICC"). A card will be issued when both of these requirements are met. Renewal Card Applications will not be affected by this change and New Card Applications submitted <u>prior</u> to January 1, 2024 will not be affected by this change.


More information will follow as to the reporting procedures and new application process.

Card Renewal Information

The Approved Provider List, New and Renewal Card Applications and current CEU requirements for card renewals are located on the NV Qualifications Program Page of our website.

Please feel free to call our office to check when your electrical card expires. This will prevent any late fees or your card falling out of the one-year grace period before final expiration. If your electrical card has been expired for more than one year, you will need to retake the appropriate electrical exam through ICC/Pearson Vue, obtain a passing score, pay the new card issuance fee and a new card will be issued to you.

ESP strongly believes that the electrical industry should maintain strong electrical training and electrical knowledge for the safety of everyone involved.



Here are four reasons why you should have and maintain your Nevada electrical card:

1. Municipalities such as the City of Reno, Clark County, City of Las Vegas and City of Henderson have requirements for at least a journeyman electrical card when installing electrical systems;

2. Many employers incentivize team members that have a Nevada Electrical Qualifications Card (journeyman or master);

3. Your electrical qualifications card shows a prospective or current employer that you are seriously committed to the electrical trade; and

4. Your electrical qualifications card shows that you have not only gone through both classroom and on the job training, but you also know and understand the current installation requirements of the NEC.
